# Better Safe Than Sorry

A Fotonovela About the Importance of Using Child Safety Seats







Health Net wants you to know how important it is to protect your children by using the right child safety seat or booster seat every time your children ride in a car. Please contact the organizations listed on the Resource List for correct guidance on child seat use. Here are some important things to know:

- All states require children to use child safety seats and safety belts. It's the law!
- In California, as of 2002, children must ride in a child safety seat or booster until they are at least six-years old or weigh at least 60 lbs., with some exceptions.
- Always buy **new** child safety seats for your children. Used seats are often dangerous due to damaged or missing parts.
- Follow instructions for correct child safety seat use.
- Infants and children are safest in the back seat. Never put a
  baby in the front seat if there is a passenger air bag.
  Air bags have killed babies.
- Place the child safety seat so the baby faces the rear of the car until he or she is at least age one and 20 pounds.
   However, it is safer to keep the baby facing the rear for as long as possible.
- Buckle up on every ride. Never allow children to sit on people's laps.
- Until age three or four, children need a child safety seat with a harness. Older children who are not big enough to fit in just a safety belt need a booster seat. **Take the 5-Step Test** to see if your child belongs in a booster seat (see page 6).
- Be a good role model: If you use your safety belt, children will learn from you.

Nobody in the family likes to talk about this terrible tragedy... But this is the way it happened... One day Raul and Lupita took the children for a ride. They didn't go very far, just to the mall that was close to their house. They only had one car seat. Since Blanca was a newborn, they buckled her into their only car seat and placed her in the back seat. Their boy, Raulito, was just 18-months old! Lupita held him on her lap.



They thought Raulito would be safe in his mother's arms. As the family was leaving the parking lot at the mall, a car crashed into them. Blanca, who was in the safety seat, was okay. She only had a scratch or two. Raulito died from a broken neck, even before I could get to the hospital.









Jorge, I see a store up ahead. Why don't we go inside and get a booster seat for Jose?







Here are three different types of safety seats. Convertible Seat set up for toddlers














Here are some questions you need to ask yourself. We call it the 5-Step Test.

- 1. Does the child sit all the way back against the auto seat?
- 2. Do the child's knees bend comfortably at the edge of the auto seat?
- 3. Does the belt cross the shoulder between the neck and the arm?
- 4. Is the lap belt as low as possible, touching the thighs?
- 5. Can the child stay seated like this for the whole trip?

If you answered "no" to any of these questions, your child needs a booster seat to ride safely in the car. Children like boosters. They are more comfortable in them! Provided by permission of SafetyBeltSafe U.S.A.





Infants and children are safest in the back seat. Place the child safety seat so the baby faces the rear of the car. Children may face forward after age one and 20 pounds.





To find out how to install the child safety seat correctly, follow the instructions in the safety seat instruction booklet and the automobile owner's manual.

Tip: Put your hand into the child safety seat and use the weight of your body to press down while you tighten the safety belt.




The child safety seat should not move more than an inch to the sides or front of the car. If it does, tighten and lock the vehicle safety belt.


